

18 Republicans


Michigan House of Representatives






Legislative Process






Immediate Effect

The Michigan Constitution, Article IV, Section 27, says, "No act shall take effect until the expiration of 90 days from the end of the session at which it was passed, but the legislature may give immediate effect to acts by a twothirds vote of the members elected to and serving in each house."

Governor's State of State Agenda:

Universal Pre-School free for all 4-year olds

Firearm Regulation – red flag and universal background laws

Tax Relief - Expand Earned Income Tax Credit and pension tax relief

Expand Elliott-Larsen Civil Rights Act to cover sexual orientation and gender identity

K-12 student help with tutors and after-school programs

Expand free tuition program for free community college or skills training schools

Remove abortion and marriage bans

Secretary of State Benson's Agenda:

During the week of January 30, 2023, the Secretary of State presented her agenda to the House Elections Committee and the Senate Elections and Ethics Committee.

She noted these issues needed to be addressed:

- Implement Proposal 2
- Align current laws with Constitutional amendments
- Put clerks in position to succeed
- Fully fund elections

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LWV Priorities

Campaign for Making Democracy Work ® ensuring a free, fair and accessible electoral system for all eligible voters by focusing on:

Voting Rights, Improving Elections,

Campaign Finance/Money in Politics,

Direct election of the President by popular vote (including through the national popular vote interstate compact and abolition of the Electoral College), and

Redistricting.

Watchlist:

Respond strategically on issues like the Equal Rights Amendment, immigration reform, climate change and, health care with LWV positions when needed, but focus on the Campaign for Making Democracy Work®

Prison gerrymandering, Campaign finance, Criminal justice, Voting rights, Environmental protection and restoration, Public education, Social justice equity, and Public health & safety.

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



Support Electing The President By National Popular Vote

ABOUT ~

The League of Women Voters of Michigan supports our state joining the National Popular Vote Compact and is encouraging our members to reach out to their legislators and voice their support.

ADVOCACY ~

Since the early 1970s, the national League of Women Voters has taken a position that direct election of the president by popular vote is essential to representative government. Michigan should join the 15 states and the District of Columbia (with 195 electoral votes) that have already enacted the National Popular Vote Compact into law.

Five of our 46 Presidents have come into office without winning the most popular votes nationwide. Enacting National Popular Vote will apply the concept of "one person, one vote" to our presidential elections. More information is available at the National Popular Vote website.


